When Helen Keller was 19 months old she contracted an illness that left her blind and deaf. When she was ten, she began working with the brilliant teacher Anne Sullivan, who taught her to communicate by spelling words on the palm of her hand.

Later, Helen was able to receive religious instruction from the eminent clergyman and educator, Phillips Brooks. As he told her about God and the One who gave his life for her, she said something quite interesting: "I knew about God before you told me, only I didn't know his name."

There are many people in the world today who know about God ... they sense his presence, they can even understand something of his nature... but they don't know who he is. It's our job to tell them. Or better, to show them.

Do you want those around to know about the God we serve? Do you want them to believe you when you say that he is loving and good and

merciful? Then show them his love and mercy and goodness. Do you want them to believe you when you say that he can make a difference in their lives? Then show them the difference he has made in your life.

I believe that the God of the Bible is the God everyone is looking for. I believe that everyone, in the deepest part of them, has a sense of His presence. But they do not know His name, and they do not know He is real - that is, until we tell them and show them.

## SEEDFUL

## THINGS

It's March. Not quite spring, not quite winter. Growing up, this was the time when the snow started to melt away and some early plants would start to emerge from the snow.

The drainage ravines were starting to run with very cold water from the melting snow.

Life emerges from the long winter. I spent endless hours leaning over the culverts that carried all that cold water downstream to Skunk Creek and into the Big Sioux River. I'd start to see tadpoles in that water and I wondered where they went during the winter!

At my school one spring, we were to bring some soybeans for an experiment. We placed the beans in a cotton-lined tray that was soaked with water and covered it with plastic wrap. In a couple of days, those beans would swell up and a tiny green shoot would emerge.

As a kid growing up on a farm, at first I was given the easy jobs so that I could be helpful. One of those jobs had to do with sowing oats. No - not wild oats! Wrong kind of sowing! If you've fertilized your lawn, you may have used a broadcast spreader that uses a propeller-like apparatus that flings the fertilizer out into a wide swath.

Our broadcast spreader was attached to the back of a wagon and it was my job to keep the hopper full of oats and not let it run dry (see picture). Some of those oat kernels fell on good tilled soil and some got flung



onto the road when we turned the corner. The oats that fell on the road in the field would sprout but not last long because it's roots couldn't penetrate the hard-packed soil on the approach leading into the field. Just like the parable of the sower.

Mark 4:3-8 "Listen! Behold, a sower went out to sow. And it happened, as he sowed, that some seed fell by the wayside; and the birds of the air came and devoured it. Some fell on stony ground, where it did not have much earth and immediately it sprang up because it had no depth of earth. But when the sun came up, it had no depth of earth. But when the sun was up it was scorched, and because it had no root, it withered away. And some seed fell among thorns; and the thorns grew up and choked it, and it yielded no crop. But other seed fell on good ground and yielded a crop that sprung up, increased and produced; some thirtyfold, some sixty, and some a hundred."

Talk about being packed with symbolism! I love the first word - LISTEN! Pay attention! Here's something we kids observed at school with our bean experiment. The bean supplies food for the growing plant until it is used up and then the original bean dies off - it's done its job. How is the soil of your heart? Are you growing in your faith? Are you serving others to help them grow? Are you in the biblical fertilizer and watering business? We all should be.

The parable of the sower is about who is fruitful (spiritually) and who is not — and what hinders fruitfulness.

Or are you stony-hearted? Are you the type who can't be satisfied and so you find fault (except in yourself) with your church, pastor, the music, — just fill in the blank.

"Don't judge each day by the harvest you reap but by the seeds that you plant." - Robert Louis Stevenson

If you think you're stony-hearted, ask God for forgiveness and ask him to soften and water your soul with the Word and the desire to think of others more than you think of yourselves. And start being fruitful Rocky! With your family, your community, and your church. It's never too late to start.

Amen? Amen.


May we sing from the bottom of our toes with everything we have in our heart, soul and mind, to our awesome God for all he has done!


